Day Two – God Rewards Those Who Seek Him

Day Three – Reviewing What We Learned Last Week

Thank you all so much for trusting me with your time and attention this week. Let's review & refresh your memory by defining these terms again (go ahead and use your notes)

General Revelation _____

(Romans 1:19-20; Psalm 19:1-4; Matthew 5:45)

Special Revelation _____

(Matthew 11:27; 2 Peter 1:16-21; 1 John 1:1-3)

Do you remember WHY we separate the idea of General Revelation from the idea of Special Revelation? It's because we are LIMITED in how much we can know about God just by looking around at the natural world. We cannot perceive God the way we ought to because of sin.

2 Corinthians 4:4 – The god of this age (Satan) has _____ our minds before we are believers in Christ

John 12:40 – Our eyes are _____ and our hearts are _____

(see also Isaiah 6:10 for context)

But thankfully, God has spoken to us! Special Revelation – when God speaks to us -- counteracts the blindness and hardness of our hearts that stand in the way of us knowing God.

2 Peter 1:19 – We pay attention to “the prophetic message” as to _____

BONUS STUDY: But what exactly is this “prophetic message”? Good question! Scholars generally agree that “the prophetic message” are the prophecies concerning Christ in the Old Testament, which are fulfilled in His coming. You can tell that this makes sense by looking back just a few verses, where Peter talks about how he heard the voice of God saying that Jesus was God's son. (*v. 17-18; compare to Matt. 17:5; Mark 9:7; Luke 9:35*) We'll take a look again at Peter's certainty about the reliability of the Old Testament prophecies about Christ when we talk about how we trust Scripture in the next few weeks.

The Existence and Knowability of God

If you missed Bible study, or missed one of these points as we were talking, here is a completed chart describing what the Bible has to say about *why* humankind doesn't know God

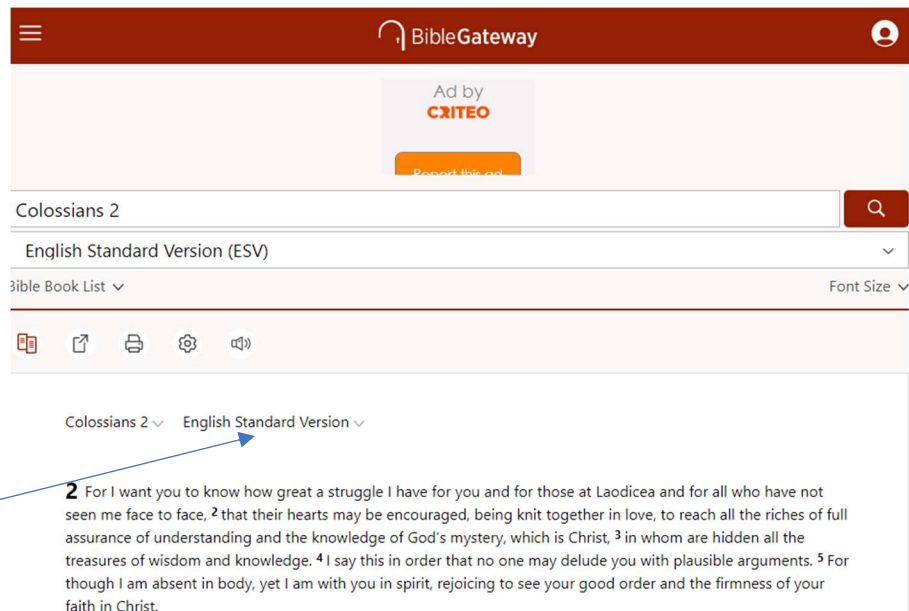
<p>We don't know God because of our foolishness</p>	<p>We might try to overcome our foolishness through wisdom</p>	<p>But ultimately, we cannot know God NOT through wisdom, but through Christ crucified <i>1 Corinthians 1:21-25</i></p>
<p>We don't know God because of our wickedness</p>	<p>We might try to overcome our wickedness by trying to be good or righteous</p>	<p>But ultimately, we cannot know God NOT through doing good or by being a good person or a holy person, but we can only come to know God through grace by faith <i>Ephesians 2:8-9</i></p>
<p>We don't know God because of Satan's work to deceive us, to blind our minds, and to suppress the truth of God</p>	<p>We might try to resist Satan on our own, or do our best to fight hard to make it in this dark world</p>	<p>But, we know God only through Christ's work on the cross, which we must receive by grace through faith, AND we also must respond by keeping God's commands as we walk in relationship with Him <i>John 14:21-24</i> We call this human responsibility</p>

We recommend the English Standard Version (ESV), the New Living Translation (NLT), the Wycliffe Bible, the King James (KJV), or the Amplified Bible, Classic Edition. Reflect on the different verbs and adjectives these translations use to describe Paul's encouragement and write about what this means for your personal faith and our life together as a church seeking Christ together.



Days Four and Five – Getting Ready for Next Week's Study

Congrats on making it this far into the homework! I know it's a commitment, and I'm praying you are being blessed by the work you are putting in.

This coming week, we are going to jump into studying **The Word of God and the Canon**.

When theologians talk about "the canon" they are talking about which ancient writings are considered part of the Bible. There are standards theologians have used through history to determine what ancient writings "count" as being authoritative for our lives.

We will talk about this in more detail at Bible study, but as a way of preparing, I'd like you to complete a challenge I periodically give to myself to help me as I study God's word. Put your Bible away, because the challenge for this exercise is doing the whole thing just from memory, off the top of your head.

In the blanks below, I want you to write out the names of the books of the Bible. Then, in the space provided to the right, I want you to write out one or two things you remember about each book. What is the book about? Can you remember any key themes this book teaches to us? Do you remember any major Bible stories that we learn there?

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BONUS STUDY: Do you really know what it means to be a Christian?

Take a look on YouTube at this short film called "Searching for God: Is There Any Reason to Believe in God Today?" <https://youtu.be/7LUhq1A7Tzs>

The lady with grey hair at around the 5 minute mark – Is she a Christian? Why or why not?

What would you say to her if you were talking to her? (If you're not sure what you would say, talk to another Christian lady and see if the two of you can practice what you might say.)

To be "nominally Christian" means to be a Christian in name only. In other words, the person just *says* they are a Christian, but maybe they have no idea what that means. In your own words, explain what makes someone a Christian, and why does that make them a Christian?

The filmmaker interviews people on the street, who say three main things about Christianity:

- 1) That God is a symbol we've created to give us something to believe in
- 2) That Christianity is a tool used to control people and to incite fear
- 3) That all religions are the same, and that we should just pick one that works for us



Have you heard people say these things before? Do any of these seem true? Do any of these make you doubt or question what you believe?

If you were defending Christianity, how would you answer each of these three statements? Can you think of any scriptures that would help you answer?

Let's get excited about the upcoming weeks by taking a walk down the Romans Road:

Maybe you've been around the church for a while, and you've heard people talk about "the Romans Road" (Or, maybe you're sitting here reading this, thinking to yourself, "What?!")

The "Romans Road" is a short Bible study using only four verses that summarize the Gospel message. It's a very simple way to explain the Gospel.

Follow along in your own Bible by looking up these verses. Maybe write some thoughts and questions you have as you read these verses

- 1) Romans 3:23 – All have sinned and fall short of the glory of God.

- 2) Romans 6:23 – The wages of sin is death.

- 3) Romans 6:23 – The free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus

- 4) Romans 10:9 – Confess with your mouth that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised Him from the dead

There is so much more to say on each of these four points, and we are going to spend time on each of them in the upcoming weeks!
